# LEGACY OF EXCELLENCE

Georgetown Prep's reputation for excellence is founded on two critical pillars: our Ignatian values and the impressive academic experience we offer. Forces at work in our world threaten both, however. Our world does not necessarily see the value of values in education, and the spirituality and service programs, coupled with the work we do to help our students understand more deeply the material we offer in the classroom, need the investment of time, talent, and treasure. Our academic programs demand great teachers, and we have to offer them decent compensation to provide the best for our students and their families in a world of rising costs. But all of this threatens to push our tuition, which only covers two-thirds of the cost of our programming, out of reach even for middle class families. Our residential program which serves students from across the nation and the world and which makes Prep unique among Jesuit schools, needs adequate facilities both for our boarding students and for the faculty and staff who care for them. Our science facilities which have served Prep students since the 1960s, need updating as we labor to compete in today's innovation-driven world. Without taking strides to support the long-term needs of our facilities, our academic offerings, and the retreat and reflection programs that are the hallmark of a Jesuit education, we will fall behind other schools and far short of our values.



In short, we need you. We need your support. We need your help. Your investment in this campaign will allow us not merely to continue the great educational and formation programs you or your son experienced as a young man; it will help us to continue the great legacy of forming men for and with others, men who will make a difference in a world that badly needs people who care, people who, in the words Ignatius wrote to his best friend Francis Xavier as he sent him on the Society of Jesus's first mission, will "set the world on fire."

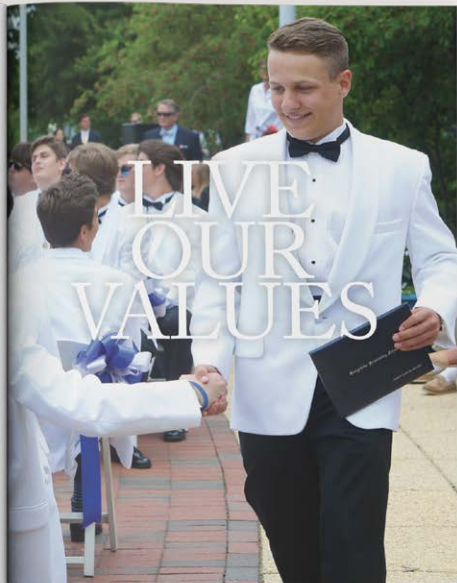

Adam was exactly the kind of young man we want at Georgetown Prep. He was brilliant and at the top of his class. He was ambitious with sights set on top universities. And he was altruistic, volunteering at a soup kitchen on the weekends and tutoring younger kids at school.

As a first-generation citizen—his parents immigrated from India—Adam was grateful for the sacrifices his parents made for him and his siblings. As Adam got older, he worried that there were not enough opportunities at his public school that would allow him to make the impact he wanted to make in the world. He applied to and was accepted to many of the nation's best schools, but his family could not afford full tuition at any of these institutions. Luckily for our community, Georgetown Prep was able to offer tuition assistance to Adam. And that investment paid off for everyone. Adam was an active and impressive member

of the Prep community. He continued to shine in the classroom and took leadership roles on student retreats. He even won the grand prize at the Global Health Design competition at Rice University when he designed a breathing device for premature infants using 3D-printed medical tubing typically discarded in hospitals.

Adam is now a junior at Georgetown University where he is studying global health. But he is already changing the world. The breathing device he designed is now being used in hospitals throughout Malawi, and Adam, with the help of his father, is working to introduce the life-saving device to other developing countries.

While Adam was always going to be an impressive young man, Georgetown Prep was an integral part of making him who he is today. He received a rigorous and impressive education, and Prep's focus on Ignatian values further cemented Adam's commitment to service and being a man for others.


