Our progress in the fight against HIV/AIDS is something to celebrate. Transmission rates in San Francisco have fallen dramatically.

We know we can do even better.

Together with our partners in city government and many peer organizations, San Francisco AIDS Foundation is at the forefront of this progress, finding innovative ways to confidently and consistently fight HIV/AIDS.

Our work is paying off. San Francisco leads the way in every step of the care continuum. And, beyond testing and prevention, our work has created an environment where knowing your status is commonplace. We have nurtured a culture of acceptance and support where running into a friend at one of our testing locations is a comfortable social experience and not a shameful or embarrassing moment.

We Won't Stop

Building on our remarkable progress, we're ready to make the next big advance: making San Francisco the first U.S. city to end HIV transmission.

While we should be proud to live in a place that has led the way in this fight, we should never accept "good enough." That's not the San Francisco way.

Nationwide, gay and bisexual men are still the hardest hit group—it's the only group where HIV transmission rates are on the rise—and, though the rate of HIV transmission has slowed in San Francisco, there were still 359 new infections in 2013. The vast majority—86 percent—were among gay and bisexual men. After a decade of operation, Magnet, our sexual health clinic, still experiences demand that outpaces supply. And, the majority of new infections in San Francisco are diagnosed at Magnet.

We will reshape the existing model for preventing and treating HIV/AIDS. Factors like drug use, mental health issues and feelings of isolation put people at higher risk for contracting and transmitting HIV. San Francisco AIDS Foundation programs address these risk factors but, under the current approach, someone seeking help with drug use and social isolation would be referred to programs in two different locations. The reality is that not everyone can follow through on those referrals. Without proper support and continuity of care, there is a chance that they could put themselves and their sexual partners at risk.

We must do better. The fight against HIV/AIDS has not been won. But it will be. **It all starts with your support for the new Center for Health & Wellness.**



One in five gay and bisexual men in San Francisco is living with HIV/AIDS.

Thirty-two percent of HIV-positive San Franciscans diagnosed in the last year are not virally suppressed, and nearly half aren't receiving ongoing care.

We Have the Plan

We are forging a bold and aggressive path that will lead to the end of HIV transmission in San Francisco. The new Center for Health & Wellness focuses on the city's hardest hit population in the heart of the Castro. The center will bring services currently delivered at separate locations to a single site, and the new space will allow us to expand our most in-demand services for gay and bisexual men.

Ending HIV transmission will require us to do more than increase our HIV testing capacity. The center's bold approach is driven by years of strategic planning as well as independent research and analysis. It will help everyone in our community navigate the issues that put them at risk not just for HIV, but for an expansive array of negative health consequences.

The brick, mortar, beams and struts that come together to establish our new Castro center will, for the first time, create a home for new and expanded services for gay and bisexual men that includes community education and prevention along with greater outreach and support for those with substance and mental health needs. The center will reinforce programs at our Mid-Market headquarters—programs for Spanish speakers, transgender women, people who use drugs and those who need housing support and case management—and our relentless advocacy on behalf of people living with HIV. Together, this approach confronts HIV/ AIDS on all fronts and leaves no room for it to thrive.

Your support will lead to big change. With your commitment, we are one step closer to ending HIV transmission in our city with a new model of care that will, once again, set a new standard for the national response.

by addressing each individual's unique needs. It will expand on the success of our high-demand programs and bring them together in one place.




